“In response to an inquiry from *The Ringer* earlier this year, the league began exploring the possibility of reclassification, as we reported in August. Later today, the league will officially announce the results of that effort and proceed with plans to assign the same major league status enjoyed by the AL and the NL to the Negro Leagues—and, in the cases of players like Mays who played in the Negro Leagues between 1920 and 1948 and later joined the AL or NL, integrate records produced in segregated leagues.”

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“The co-founder of Kansas City’s Negro Leagues Baseball Museum, Lester cried tears of joy that his more than half-century of work was recognized, and that a greater air of legitimacy might be lent to the statistics of Black ballplayers deprived the chance to compete in a league bent on maintaining segregation.

And he cried tears of sadness that so many of his friends and Negro Leagues legends – be it Larry Doby, who integrated the American League, Cuban trailblazer Minnie Minoso, or Giants great Monte Irvin – did not live long enough to see the day.”
